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GENERAL INFORMATION

PLEASE BRING: EVERY Thursday, your student should bring a backpack, lunch, PENCILS and required class materials.

COMMUNICATION: In order to save money on postage and copying, and for efficiency; homework, notices, upcoming events etc. will be e-mailed and also will be posted on our website (www.HomeEdOnline.com, click on "Homeschool Academy" to go to specific info). When needed, we will also hand out notices at each location. It is your responsibility to be sure that you are up-to-date on all information. Please check your e-mail or the website regularly for updates.

LUNCH: All students should bring a sack lunch (Please, because of the mess they make, NO pizza lunchables and no RED or PURPLE juice!) There is no access to a refrigerator or microwave. Please send everything that your child needs for their lunch – cup, bowl, spoon, fork, and drink. We CANNOT provide utensils, plates, straws etc. for your child, so please be sure that they have everything they need for their lunch. *****Because of the prevalence and potential severity of peanut allergies, and to protect our students who are at risk, we ask that students in grades K-5 NOT bring peanut butter in their lunches.*****

GRADES: Each semester, **students in grades 3-5** receive marks for both **Class Conduct** (behavior, respect for teacher and students, talking etc.) and for **Class Participation** (participating in class, turning in homework, etc.). Grades given for each are: E (Excellent), G (Good), S (Satisfactory), U (Unsatisfactory). **Students in grades 6-12** receive a letter grade for class work and homework.

LOST AND FOUND: Please be sure your child has all their belongings each week. Our lost and found pile becomes HUGE and we cannot keep items indefinitely.

SOUTH HIGHLAND BAPTIST CHURCH generously allows us to use their facility for our classes. However, the Academy is NOT AFFILIATED with this church in any way. Their staff is not equipped to handle Academy inquiries. Unless you need to contact us on a Thursday, PLEASE direct all of your communication to Academy (academy@homeedonline.com; Tamara-224-3934; Jill-228-0943; Terri-851-7911)

SHADOWING: Since we only meet once a week, and since the number of requests for shadowing became overwhelming, we do not allow students to shadow at Academy at any grade level. Parents are welcomed and encouraged to visit with their children, but we cannot have children shadow Academy students in classes.

PARENT INVOLVEMENT in the Academy is not required on a day-to-day basis. However, we do welcome questions, observations, parent-teacher meetings etc. From time to time, we also need substitutes due to teacher absences. To help with this, we would like to offer a "substitute plan" in which we would keep a list of parents who would like to serve as a substitute in any of the classes. In return for your help, we would provide pre-school child-care (if needed) and a reduction in tuition for each day you substitute. We will also provide you with curriculum for the class you teach. Since we often don't know about teacher absences until the morning of classes, this does require flexibility. Please let us know if you are interested.

CLOSURES DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER will be posted on the 3 local news stations (look for "Little Rock Homeschool Academy") and on our website. Usually, we will follow the same schedule as the Pulaski County School District.

STUDENT GUIDELINES

The following rules have been established at the Academy in order to create and maintain an academically, morally and socially healthy atmosphere for your children, These guidelines are non-negotiable and will be enforced by both teachers and Academy directors.

DRESS CODE (applies to teachers as well as students)

Bottom of shirt and top of pants must overlap, even when bending over

Shirt straps must be at least 2 inches wide

No skintight pants or shirts

Shirt should show no cleavage

No offensive language/symbolism on t-shirts

No mini skirts (skirts should be no shorter than 4 inches above the knee)

Shorts must be of modest length

If in dispute, Academy directors maintain the right to have the final say about appropriate dress.

HOMEWORK POLICY

On occasion, the teachers will assign homework to your child. When possible, we will list assignments on the announcement board and on the web site. We do expect homework to be completed as assigned. The first instance of missed homework will result in the student being given a warning. The second missed homework assignment will result in parental notification. If a third assignment is missed, possible dismissal will be discussed.

BEHAVIOR

No foul or borderline language allowed.

No name-calling allowed.

No hitting or other physical aggression allowed.

No smoking or illegal drug use is allowed.

Students are expected to show respect to teachers and other students.

No public display of affection between boys and girls.

Academy staff maintains the right to discipline for any other behavior seen as dangerous or inappropriate.

DISCIPLINE POLICY

The first time a child is disciplined, the teacher will talk to the child. The second infraction will result in the teacher bringing the child to the appropriate director. The third time will result in a director - parent - child conference. In extreme situations the parent may be called in the first time.

ALSO . . .

Please notify Academy Directors *in writing* if your child will be leaving Academy with another adult.

We do not allow: CD players, IPODS (even during study hall or recess) electronic games, roller blades or shoes, skateboards, scooters, weapons or potential weapons of any type (guns, knives, explosives etc.)

Students may not make or receive calls or text messages from their cell phones while they are in class. We reserve the right to confiscate any of these items if it becomes necessary.

TUITION INFORMATION AND POLICIES

TUITION PAYMENTS (if you are paying monthly) are due on the first Thursday of each month, **starting September 9th**. NOTE: Payments are made monthly, even during months like December, when Academy only meets for one week. This is necessary for us to be able to break your payments into 8 increments, otherwise your monthly amount would be higher.

Tuition for the 2010-2011 school year:

- 1 student \$61.88 (8 monthly payments) \$495 (total)
- 2 Students \$118.13 (8 monthly payments) \$945 (total)
- 3 Students \$168.75 (8 monthly payments) \$1350 (total)
- 4 Students \$216.00 (8 monthly payments) \$1728 (total)

Tuition Policy: Payments (checks, please, NO CASH) can be put in a box on the table in the Fellowship Hall entryway at South Highland. If payment is not received, we will have to assess a \$5.00 late fee per week. In consideration of our agreement to provide educational service(s) to your child(ren), you agree to the following:

- 1) Tuition will be paid by the 1st Thursday of each month, beginning in August and ending in April, unless prior arrangements are made.
- 2) Two weeks prior, written notice will be given in the event a student is going to drop from Academy. If no such notice is given, you will be responsible for any tuition payment incurred until notice has been given.
- 3) You agree to pay \$2.00 per month billing charge for each month that there is a balance on your account. This charge is intended to cover our cost for billing you each month.
- 4) In the event that you do not pay your account as agreed, you agree to be responsible for all costs of collecting your account so that Little Rock Homeschool Academy will receive 100% of the charges incurred, even if this account is turned over for collections. As a result, if this account is placed for collections, you will be responsible for the original tuition amount, plus court costs, services, fees and the fees charged to LRHA by the attorney to collect this amount. The collection fee is currently 40% of the tuition amount owed.
- 5) You agree that, in the event suit must be brought to collect on this account, the proper jurisdiction and venue for suit will be Pulaski County, Arkansas.
- 6) You agree that Little Rock Homeschool Academy or its agent may request information from credit reporting agencies for all purposes it deems necessary in order to collect your account.

DROP-OFF and PICK-UP:

Parents can drop students off in the following areas:

- K-2nd grade students can be dropped off at lower glass doors (far side of parking lot)
- 3rd-8th grade students can be dropped off at double glass doors at upper level of parking lot.
- 9th-12th grade students can be dropped off or enter at door under overhang. High school students who are driving should park along the street on the church side ONLY

Unless special arrangements have been made PLEASE DO NOT DROP YOUR CHILDREN OFF EARLY. In the mornings, we are busy setting up the classrooms and preparing for the day, so no one is available to supervise your child until 8:45 am.

Pick-Up is as follows:

- You will need to drive through the parking lot (stay in your car!) in order to pick up your children. Please enter the parking lot at the second driveway entrance and exit through the first driveway entrance. Upon entrance to the lot, your family card will be pulled. The cards will be taken inside and used to help get your children ready to come to the car.

- **For students in K-8th grades**, a teacher will call your student to come to your car once you approach the entrance. None of these students will be allowed to cross the parking lot.

- **K-2nd grade students** should be picked up at the lower glass doors. If you have no student older than 2nd grade, we ask that you **pick up at 2:15** in order to help traffic flow. If you have other students who are older than 2nd grade, we ask that you **begin pick up at 2:30**.

- For their protection, students in grades K-8 will NOT be able to leave the building until their ride (parent or assigned carpool) is in front of the carpool line. A student in one of these grades can ride home with a sibling ONLY with written permission from the parent and only if the sibling comes to pick them up at the door or in carpool line. **NO K-8th GRADE STUDENT IS ALLOWED TO LEAVE UNSUPERVISED – NO EXCEPTIONS.**

- **Students in grades 9-12** will be allowed to leave directly from class.

- If at all possible, please avoid coming to the doors to pick up your students. Also, this is a really bad time to try to talk to those of us who are helping with pick-up. We want to hear your concerns and PROMISE that we will talk to you once pick-up is over OR return phone calls or e-mails once we get home.

We want to honor the time of our teachers and allow them to go home on time AND there is a lot of clean-up that has to be done at the end of the day. Therefore, we ask that you honor the pick-up times. Except in case of emergencies, a late pick-up fee of \$1.00 for every 5 minutes late will be assessed.

Dear Parents,

We will be using an additional resource with our curriculum from Scholastic Books. They publish an excellent weekly magazine that coordinates with our topics.

Other Items

Allergies: Please let us know if your child is allergic to any food item. At times we will have snacks or treats for the children.

Show and Tell: We will have Show & Tell each Thursday. Show and Tell items must be kept in their backpacks until time for Show and Tell.

Scholastic Book Orders: Periodically we will send home a book order form. Make all checks payable to "Scholastic Books." All orders and checks should be given to your child's teacher. You are not obligated to order any books. This is just an offer that we make available to you.

Field Trips: First graders will take two field trips (one each semester). With all field trips, we need 5 to 6 volunteer drivers. All fieldtrips will be on Thursdays during class time.

3rd-5th GRADE CLASS DESCRIPTIONS & SUPPLIES

Art (Bethany Allison):

This year we will study art through ancient civilizations. The students will learn about a culture and its art and complete a project in the medium of the time. Civilizations to be studied this fall include, pre-historic art, Minoan Art, Egyptian art and Chinese art.

(supplies: \$7 art fee, notebook or folder with loose leaf paper for taking notes, pen or pencil each week)

History (Michelle Younkman):

We will travel through and explore the history and geography of the 50 states.

(supplies: \$13 fee for copies and monthly publication to be used in class; 3-ring binder – 1” size with see-through view screen on front; colored pencils; map of USA; notebook paper)

Science (Patti Lyle):

This year students will learn about Weather in the fall semester and Insects in the spring semester. This science class will be very interactive. We will have 3 quizzes and a test each semester.

(supplies: \$7 supply fee to be paid at Parent Meeting, Three-ring view binder-1 ½ inch (stays with teacher during semester), 50 sheets of lined paper to put in binder, set of 5 dividers for notebook, pencils)

Sign Language (Pamela Taylor):

Students will learn ways to communicate with persons who are deaf, including the manual alphabet and American Sign Language. The class will learn to sign various songs throughout the year and learn signs to allow them to have conversations with deaf individuals. Discussions will also help students see what life is like for people who are deaf and how they cope with everyday situations.

(supplies: none needed)

Writing (Cathy Lee): 3rd-4th Grade:

3rd-4th graders will study grammar, sentence structure and paragraph writing using the book Wordsmith Apprentice from Common Sense Press. "An easy to use writing course encouraging students to develop their writing skills as they participate in every role on a newspaper staff: editor, reporter, writer, etc. Children develop a love for writing as they express themselves through sentence and paragraph writing, persuasive writing, and much more." **5th Grade:** The fifth graders will be diving into the area of editing using the book, The Great Editing Adventure Series Book I, also from Common Sense Press. "Students learn and review grammar as they search for the errors in these exciting stories. Volume I contains three separate stories with a total of 90 lessons. Editing exercises teach and review grammar, writing mechanics, spelling, vocabulary, finding synonyms with a thesaurus, and dictionary use. Written by the creators of Learning Language Arts Through Literature."

(supplies: 3rd-4th grade - Wordsmith Apprentice; Common Sense Press, one newspaper to use throughout the year; 5th grade - Great Editing Adventure Series Book I; Common Sense Press; all- pen or sharpened pencil, notebook, access to dictionary and thesaurus)

6th GRADE DESCRIPTIONS & SUPPLIES

Art (Lisa Thomas):

Your student will be introduced to art by working with many different types of art mediums for various art experiences throughout the school year. Some examples would be: collage, clay, sketching, water colors, water color pencils, paper mache and string art. In the second semester a recycled art project will be due, very specific guidelines and rules will be spelled out in class. Most projects will be finished at Academy, but homework may be assigned as deemed necessary.

(supplies: \$10 art fee to be paid at Parent Meeting; composition notebook, pocket folder, 4 sharpened pencils.)

History (Enid Valentine): TBD

(supplies: folder with prongs and pockets; paper; pen or pencil)

Math (Lorri Harper):

The class covers the math involved in shopping with sales, eating out & tipping, budgeting, and household bills, (electric, gas, phone, & credit cards).

(supplies: \$3 copy fee to be paid at Parent Meeting, pencil, paper, simple calculator, folder for work)

Science (Lanette Stewart):

We will begin the year discussing the some history of Science and the scientific method, then move into a study of Life Science. Material and experiments will be taken from the Apologia General Science text. (Book not necessary for the class.)

(supplies: \$5 supply fee; any notebook, pencil or pen, and a few colored pencils.)

Writing (Lorri Harper):

History based writing lessons in structure, style, vocabulary and grammar.

(supplies: \$5 copy fee to be paid at Parent Meeting, folder for work, pen, paper, highlighter)

7th GRADE DESCRIPTIONS & SUPPLIES

Art (Lisa Thomas):

Your student will study famous artists and their works of art. They will copy that artists technique in a new project or mimic one of their famous pieces of work. Experience an entire painting process from sketch to a finished painting. Seasonal projects may be used throughout the year. A recycled art project will be due late second semester, with very clear guidelines and expectations explained in class. Most projects are finished in class, but occasional homework will be assigned as needed.

(supplies: \$10 art fee to be paid at Parent Meeting; composition notebook, pocket folder, 4 sharpened pencils.)

History (Enid Valentine): TBD

(supplies: folder with prongs and pockets; paper; pen or pencil)

Math (Lanette Stewart):

This class will be studying a mixture of pre-algebra. We will start with problems with fractions as a review and then build up to solving a variety of equations. If time permits towards the end of the school year, we will also work on some graphing problems.

(supplies: \$5 copy fee, pencils, notebook paper, pocket folder, NO PENS OR CALCULATORS)

Science (Lanette Stewart):

This year, we will discuss Archeology, Geology and the Fossil Record. Material and experiments will be taken from the Apologia General Science text. (Book not necessary for the class.)

(supplies: \$5 supply fee, any notebook, pencil or pen, a few colored pencils)

Writing (Debbie Hopper):

History based writing lessons in structure, style, vocabulary and grammar.

(supplies: \$5 copy fee to be paid at Parent Meeting, folder for work, pen, paper, highlighter)

8th GRADE CLASS DESCRIPTIONS & SUPPLIES

Art (Lisa Thomas):

The students will experience a variety of different painting techniques using different types of paints. They will also be exposed to several unique art forms by studying different artists and their style of art. A recycled art project will be due in the second semester, guidelines and specifics will be spelled out in great detail in class. Outside homework will be at a minimum as most projects were finished in class, but occasional outside work will be necessary.

(supplies: \$10 art fee to be paid at Parent Meeting; composition notebook, pocket folder, 4 sharpened pencils.)

History (Janet Rogers):

1st Semester: Civil War—from beginning to Gettysburg; 2nd Semester: Civil war from Gettysburg to the end
(supplies: \$5 copy fee to be paid at Parent Meeting; folder with pockets, pen and/or pencil, colored pencils, ruler, small glue, pencil sharpener, plastic bag to hold items)

Oral Presentation (Rachel Lee):

Students will become familiar with the types of speech by presenting and becoming more comfortable in front of their classmates, giving them a jump-start for their required high school course.

(supplies: notebook (any type) with pockets, loose-leaf paper, pencil, props for various speeches)

Science (Lyn Gladden):

We will be studying astronomy and earth science. Earth science will be the main focus of the first semester. We will classify rocks and study earth forms. We will also begin to use a planisphere to identify constellations in the fall and winter evening sky. Astronomy will be the main focus of the second semester. We will learn more about the other planets in our solar system, and we will study deep space objects and astro-physic theories. There will be an opportunity to go to the Episphere in April. Students will be expected to take notes and complete homework. There will be occasional quizzes, a project, a report, occasional homework, and students will also need to practice star and planet identification as it is taught in class.

(supplies: \$7 supply fee for planisphere - to be ordered by Academy, any notebook and a pen or pencil)

Writing (Nancy Wheeler):

This class will focus on creative writing all year. In the fall we will be writing tall tales, fables, folk tales, and poetry. In the spring we will be writing fractured fairy tales and talking about the elements of a good story.

HIGH SCHOOL INFORMATION

Accountability - Because our high school students will be coming and going throughout the day, it is **required** that they **sign in** upon arrival and **sign out** when they leave the campus. Students may enter through the middle door, come down the hallway, and sign their name in the notebook at the table in front of the library.

Responsibility - We hold the high school students responsible for knowing what is required in each class. If parents have questions, please inquire first of your student, then of the teacher or director. Assignments and notices will be posted on the website; always check there first to verify information. In regard to the science labs, it is the parents' responsibility to make sure the student is reading and answering questions as outlined by the syllabus.

Part Time Students - Because many of the students will not attend our 9:00 a.m. assembly time, we will send important announcements to all students via their parent's e-mail. Just a reminder - part time students are not allowed to stay on campus for the entire day.

Study Hall - A student is not allowed to take two consecutive hours of study hall, unless there are extenuating circumstances and it has been cleared with the Director. Lunch is not counted as a study hall. Any high school enrolled student may come for the lunch hour, regardless of their class schedule. Visitors may come only at lunchtime, must be approved by the High School Director, and must sign in and out.

Pizza - There will be no student ordering of delivered pizza this year. If you have a friend, teacher, or parent coming on campus and they want to bring you a fast food lunch, that's fine.

Off-campus lunch - 11th & 12th graders ONLY will have the privilege of going out for lunch once a month. Students are expected to sign out and return to classes on time. Tentative dates for off-campus lunch are: September 23, October 21, November 18, January 20, February 17, March –none due to breaks, April 14. No student will be allowed to participate unless they have a parent-signed form on file.

Parking - For safety reasons, students who drive should not park in the main parking lot. High school students should park their cars on the gravel lot or on the street that runs besides the building, with the exception of parking in front of the church office sidewalk. High school students are not allowed to sit in their cars during lunch or at any other time during the day. Students must use EXTREME CAUTION and slow speed when driving in the parking lot - younger students are going to and from recess! We cannot overemphasize the need for caution at all times when entering and leaving the parking lot!!!

End of the day - High school students may exit through either hallway and wait for their parents to pick them up, or proceed to their cars. High school students are to stay out of the fellowship hall where younger students are being summoned for pick-up.

Cell phones/text messaging - Students will be required to put phones on silent during class time. There will be no text messaging allowed in class. Phones that are taken out during class may be confiscated at the teachers' discretion.

Changes in elective choices - Students will be given two weeks to make changes in their schedule. Students will only be allowed to switch classes if there is room in the desired class.

Academic Participation - Any student who refuses to complete three assignments will be given a warning. Five missed assignments will signify that the student does not desire to be in the class; the student will be required to drop that elective. We understand there can be extenuating circumstances; the Director will consider cases on an individual basis.

Dropped classes - If a student drops a class after nine weeks, the student will be given an "F" for that class on their semester report card.

Credit for transcript - We issue grades each semester; we do not issue transcript credit. Parents are to determine, based on the work done both at Academy and home, how much credit should be assigned to each course.

HIGH SCHOOL CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

9th Grade Composition (*Debbie Hopper*)- This class will focus on grammar and composition; specifically the five paragraph report and essay. Different forms of essays will be covered including expository, persuasive, compare and contrast, narrative, and critique. We will work toward the AP level.

10th Grade Composition (*Nancy Wheeler*) - The fall semester will consist of more traditional types of writing (descriptive, persuasive, etc). The spring semester will be creative writing, story writing, and writing to entertain.

11th Grade Composition (*Debbie Hopper*) - This class will focus the first semester on creative writing and a review of essay writing. The second semester will focus on writing a term paper.

12th Grade Composition (*Terri Oxner*)- The class will focus on developing the students' abilities to put their creative thoughts on paper. They will cover essays, writing and analyzing short stories, keeping a journal, mystery writing and various styles of poetry. They will be graded on content as well as grammar, usage, and mechanics of writing. Keeping their journal is a requirement, not optional, and will be a portion of the overall grade, but it is a minimal requirement -- minimum three entries per week and a minimum five sentences per journal entry.

Advanced Biology (*Lyn Gladden*) - DUE TO TIME DEMANDS, THIS CLASS WILL COVER 2 CLASS PERIODS. This course is an in-depth anatomy and physiology course which thoroughly covers the workings of the human body. Because it is an upper-level course with college-level subject matter, regular biology is a definite prerequisite, and chemistry is a recommended pre-requisite. This will be a great course for any senior (or strongly science-minded junior) who is considering a career in the medical / science field. In class, students will have the opportunity to use microscopes to look at slides of various body tissues; practice bone identification with a small, plastic skeleton; and dissect a cow eye, a sheep heart, and a fetal pig. We will also discuss the material covered in each chapter of the textbook. There will be tests every few weeks, plus a final each semester.

American Government/Civics (*Debbie Sadler*) - We will be studying American government, including the different functions of our 3 branches of government, local and state government, and our roles as responsible citizens. The second semester will also include a brief survey of economics.

American Journeys (*Nancy Wheeler*)-This is an American history class, covering the various journeys the different peoples of America made during its times of westward expansion and crisis. This will include the Underground Railroad, Westward Expansion, Indian Removal and Dust Bowl migrants.

American Literature (*Debbie Hopper*) – Introduces students to works by America’s prominent writers from several different periods. We will read approximately 15 American classics throughout the year. Students will be responsible for own books.

Art (*Rebekah Holloway*) –Many different mediums will be taught to help encourage the use of the student’s creativity, with the students choosing their own medium the second semester. No talent required!

Biology (*Enid Valentine*) – This is Apologia’s biology course, *Exploring Creation with Biology*. Students will learn about life science topics like cell structure, genetics, ecosystems, the five kingdoms,

creation and evolution, and more.

British Literature (*Debbie Sadler*) – Recommended for 11th or 12th graders, but can be taken by younger high schoolers who are avid readers. We will read and discuss several books written by British authors, as well as study literary devices employed in different works. We will briefly discuss poetry, as well (not necessarily British poetry).

Chemistry (*Cary Hiatt*) – This is Apologia's chemistry course, *Exploring Creation with Chemistry*. Students will learn about topics like atoms and molecules, chemical equations, solutions, kinetics, energy & heat, and more. This year this class will be offered as a 1 or 2 hour class. Students may choose to take the lecture part of class to go over the concepts and formulas they have read about in the text. The second hour will be a lab only class with no time set aside for teaching the concepts from the text.

Choir (*Nancy Wheeler*) – This class is performance based. Basic music theory will be covered within the context of the music that we will be performing. There will be a concert in December and in April.

Cinematography (*Debbie Hopper*) - This course will study the history of movie making in America. Quite an interesting elective for movie buffs. It would include lighting, camera angles, musical scores, the evolution of recording (from one camera to multiple cameras), etc. Parents will have the opportunity to sign off on movies to ensure that they are approved for watching. Potential: Charlie Chaplin, John Wayne, Ginger Rogers & Fred Astaire, Audrey Hepburn, Jimmy Stewart, Hitchcock, Elvis, Star Wars, Pixar.

College Test Preparation (*Rebekah Holloway*) - Get prepared to take your college entrance exams. Recommended for juniors. Focus on preparing to take the tests, with test taking hints, practice test and developing critical thinking skills.

Concepts of Algebra (*Lanette Stewart*) – We'll be discussing some of the general concepts of Algebra and ways to make the study of Algebra "painless". This is not a complete course, but a "help" class.

French 1 (*Linda Allison*) - French I is an introduction to the French language and culture. Students will be introduced to new vocabulary and grammar each week and will practice both written and spoken expression. Class time will include practice of pronunciation by repetition and by participating in conversations.

French 2 (*Linda Allison*) - This course will continue where French I left off. Class time will include practice of pronunciation by repetition and by participating in conversations. (Supplies: TBD)

Home Economics (*Lisa Thomas*) - The students will be challenged to learn different cooking techniques, learn how to budget their food monies, how to incorporate a healthy diet, and household basics such as laundry and cleaning tips, and very basic sewing. Each student will be expected to bring their own cooking utensils. We will be making a recipe file for each student to keep.

Latin I (*Linda Allison*) – This course is based upon Wheelock's Latin, Latin Made Simple, So You Really Want to Learn Latin?, and Canon Press's Latin Grammar and meets the requirements for a first year Latin course: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd noun and adjective declensions; all 5 verb conjugations in the present, imperfect, future, perfect, pluperfect, and future perfect tenses; imperatives of verbs; comparison of adjectives; formation of adverbs; English derivatives; translations; weekly quizzes; and

semester finals.)

Latin 2 (*Linda Allison*) - This course is based upon Wheelock's Latin, *Latin Made Simple, So You Really Want to Learn Latin?*, and Canon Press's *Latin Grammar* and meets the requirements for a second year Latin course: 4th and 5th declension nouns; pronouns: personal, intensive, reflexive, and relative; locative case; expressions of time and direction; passive voice in all the tenses; deponent verbs; semi-deponent verbs; participles; ablative absolutes; all tenses of infinitives; indirect statements; subjunctive mood; jussive subjunctive; irregular verbs; causal clauses; English derivatives; translations; weekly quizzes; and semester finals.

Personal Finance (*Rebekah Holloway*) –Students will learn about income and expenses as well as assets and liabilities. Students will go through student material related to Dave Ramsey's *Financial Peace Seminar* with an emphasis on daily financial activities (checkbook, budgeting etc.) They will learn how to budget for short and long term expenses. Access to a computer and the internet will be necessary in order to complete assignments.

Photography (*Kim Magnus*) – Teaches basic photography techniques. Students will work throughout the year to build a portfolio and compete for cash prizes at the end of the year.

Physical Science (*Lyn Gladden*) —This is a science dealing with non-living matter. We will cover subjects such as motion, chemistry, earth science, and astronomy. Using the textbook *Exploring Creation with Physical Science* by Dr. Jay L. Wile, we will cover the experiments from each chapter and briefly discuss the topics covered in the chapter. Students will read one chapter each week at home and come to class ready to do the experiments for that chapter. There will be a test every third week covering the experiments and some of the subject matter from the previous two chapters.

Physics Lab (*Lyn Gladden*)- This course will be the lab companion to the text book *Exploring Creation with Physics*, 2nd edition, by Dr. Jay Wile (Apologia Ministries; ISBN:1-932012-42-7).

Students will be required to read the text at home and come to class prepared to complete the experiments for the assigned chapters. The class will cover each chapter in approximately two weeks, though some chapters may be covered in one week and others in three weeks. Each semester there will be notebook checks, an open book quiz, and a few worksheets, but there will not be any chapter tests in class; therefore, parents are encouraged to purchase the Solutions and Test booklet that goes along with this course. As time allows, I will work with students on the math problems in this course.

Prerequisites: Physical science, Algebra 1, and geometry or trigonometry (the student should be familiar with calculating sine, cosine, and tangent). First day requirements: For the first day of Academy, all students are expected to come to class having read Modules 1 and 2 (to page 68).

Sociology (*Wade Poe*)- “Have you ever wondered why individuals and groups of people do what they do or think the way they think? Sociology is the study of the habits that people and groups have and a look at the changes they go through. It can help us understand the cultures, societies, and groups all around us and give us tools for better interactions with people who are different.

Spanish I & II - NOTE: We will be piloting a new approach to Spanish this year. It will be a special offering open to any high school (9th-12th grade) students and will not count as one of your classes for full or part time status. This class will be offered on Thursday evenings from 5:30-7:00 at the same location as Academy. This will be a conversational class with total immersion into the language. It is like a LAB class for Spanish. It is appropriate for those who are just starting Spanish or those who have already had some Spanish. The class will be taught by Fidel Samour. The teacher is Lebanese, but was born and raised in El Salvador. He speaks many languages fluently and is very good with

teens. He is actively involved in Fellowship Bible church in Cabot and works at Arkansas Children's hospital. ***Because this is a special offering there will be no added tuition fees regardless of your students other class load. There will be a class fee of \$150 for the year.*** This can be broken down and added into your tuition check if you prefer not to pay it all at once. In order to register for this class just send an email to Academy@HomeEdOnline.com. We only have 15 spots available.

Speech (*Terri Oxner*) – The goal of this class is to teach students the basic skills needed for making public speeches, and to help them overcome fear of public speaking. Note: Participation in speeches is NOT optional in this class and is a major part of the grade.

Theatre (*Nancy Wheeler*) - Whether it's acting, costuming, lighting, sets or sound. All aspects of theatre will be taught in class with a final performance at the end of the year.

It explains grammar, usage, and mechanics rules and provides an overview of the writing process and strategies for effective writing. The text discusses research skills such as using the dictionary, using the library, and documenting sources in a research paper. Included are up-to-date examples of MLA documentation style and a sample research paper.

Advanced Biology (*Lyn Gladden*) - \$35.00 lab fee, text: *The Human Body, Fearfully and Wonderfully Made!* by Dr. Jay L. Wile and Marilyn M. Shannon, M.A. (absolutely required for class), the *Solutions Manual* to this text (highly recommended), any notebook, pen or pencil. Additionally recommended, but not required: *The Anatomy Coloring Book* by Wynn Kapit and Lawrence M. Elson. This is a good tool, which is used by many college-level anatomy classes, and it is highly recommended by the author of the book.

American Government/Civics (*Debbie Sadler*) - Paper and pen for taking notes; free on-line textbook, *thisnation.com*; *Whatever Happened to Penny Candy*, by Richard Maybury (previous students may have used copies to sell)
